
One of our most popular grants, this program was instituted in 2000 for full-time graduate students (Master's and Ph.D.) enrolled at accredited colleges and universities. Projects must include a clear and well-defined research topic that benefits sustainable agriculture in the Southern Region. A candidate may only receive one award in their graduate student career.

General Info:

- Awards can be **up to \$22,000**
- Projects are for 24 months
- A faculty/researcher advisor is a requirement for students to apply
- · Helps introduce sustainable ag
- A good introduction to grant writing
- · Builds student research portfolio
- · Develops relationship with SARE
